Four runners bettered the previous course record, led by Steve Smalzel of Salida, Colo., in a phenomenal 5:29. Chris Parks, a 2:35-marathoner from Gunnison, Colo., cut almost two and one-half hours from his previous course best time to finish second, and Hardrock 100 champion Scott Hirst ran strongly to finish in 6:35.

All the runners enjoyed a beautiful late summer day in the Elk Range.

The Machickanee 50 was held in a

fairly remote section of the Machickanee County Forest, near Abrams, in northeastern Wisconsin. Heavy rains two days before the race turned a couple of short sections of the trail into swamp. Fortunately, runners were able to bypass these wet areas, and remained their cheerful selves throughout the somewhat muddy day

Joe Johnson blazed out to a fast start, and soon left all other runners in his wake. Only Andy Holak and Paul Olson remained close for the first three laps, while eventual winner Wayne Christopherson started slowly but then began picking off runners as the race progressed.

Holak finally caught Johnson at the start of the fifth and last lap, and while they chatted briefly at the aid station, Wayne Christopherson came blazing in and took off again like a whirlwind, eventually winning by six minutes. Paul Olson passed Holak during the last lap to take second, while Holak held on to finish his first ultra in third. Johnson, a little winded from his blazing start, finished fourth.

Liz Johnson ran a superb race, and came on strong during the last lap to take a convincing win in only her second ultra.

Special congratulations to all of the first time ultra finishers: Daniel Heins, Kevin Greatens, Joe Root, Joanne Furton, Carla Anderson, Andy Holak, and especially 19-year-old Alan Hollo, who ran a great race despite never having run over 16 miles before. Great job! At the other end of the spectrum, Rolly Portelance, from Chelmsford, Ontario, finished his 98th ultramarathon

Volunteers from the Holak and Hammar clans also worked hard at the three aid stations and start/finish area to provide runners with treats and encouragement during the race and a post-race pizza feed afterwards. Fun was had by all.
